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PROCLAMATIONS – CONTINUED

Mayor Fisher recognized Vice Mayor Burrie who chaired this event a few years prior.

Florida Bicycle Month

Mayor Fisher, on behalf of the Pompano Beach City Commission and residents, read a proclamation proclaiming March 2016 as Florida Bicycle Month. In addition, Mayor Fisher thanked Mark Beaudreau Recreation Programs Administrator for spearheading the event.

Mark Beaudreau, Recreation Programs Administrator, invited everyone to support the event on March 19, 2016 from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m., at the Community Park parking lot off Northwest 10th Street. He stated that it is a free event for kids from 8-12 years old.

<p>CITY COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES March 8, 2016</p> <p>PAGE 3</p> <p><u>AUDIENCE TO BE HEARD – CONTINUED</u></p> <p><u>Proposed RaceTrac Location</u> – Ralph Daniels, 3300 Northeast 10th Terrace, Apt. 20, Pompano Beach, FL 33064, expressed concern about the lack of activity on the property located at Northeast 33rd Street and Federal Highway. He indicated that he had heard that a RaceTrac facility was proposed for the location, but to date not much demolition has taken place. They had taken down the existing store and the rocks were put back in the location, which is allowing parking for the Tire Kingdom facility or some others.</p> <p><u>Bulk Pickup and Underground Garbage Cans</u> – Mr. Daniels asked about the situation with the bulk pickup. He complained that the Cresthaven neighborhood is a disaster, because they have not seen a truck since the new carts went out.</p> <p>Additionally, Mr. Daniels indicated that since the new carts are out for trash pickup, he understood that the City would be filling in the underground garbage cans. He reported that he has sixty four (64) of those containers.</p> <p>Mayor Fisher indicated that the City would be picking up the underground garbage cans; nevertheless, Vice Mayor Burrie would provide an update on the issue.</p> <p><u>Recycling Bins Replacement</u> – Mr. Daniels complained that he noticed when the recycling bins were picked up, they were not being replaced where they were supposed to be.</p> <p>Russell Ketchem, Solid Waste Manager, indicated that he would provide Mr. Daniels with his business card so he could contact him with any type of complaints about solid waste pickup.</p> <p>Vice Mayor Burrie in response to Mr. Daniels comments made earlier, agreed that the Cresthaven and the Highland areas are a disaster. In fact, she had contacted Mr. Ketchem, who had promised to report to her today.</p>

Vice Mayor Burrie pointed out that everyone in the City had his or her pickup days changed. For instance, in their area, bulk pickup was planned for last Friday, but people were putting everything out on the Tuesday as well as the Monday, although no pickup was done on Friday. In fact, for more than a week now garbage has been piling up. Due to the many rentals in the Cresthaven/Highland areas, furniture and other bulky items are all over the streets. She stated that while the new carts look great there are piles of garbage around them that need to be removed.

Finally, Vice Mayor Burrie indicated that the City will be filling in the underground cans to be removed at no cost to the resident. Nevertheless, Mr. Ketchem can provide an update on the bulk pickup issue.

Mayor Fisher understood that at Northeast 33rd Street and Federal Highway, on the north end where the former dance studio was located will become a RaceTrac facility, and south of the Club Cinema, there is discussion to locate a Walmart Grocery Store. Therefore, they are in the demolition phase at this time but staff and City Attorney Berman have been working closely on this item.

Mark E. Berman, City Attorney, responded that the permit has been approved and they are moving ahead. However, there have been some delays in order to get some things cleared up, but they will be working on the south end, the north end and up to where the club is located. Currently, the club remains but when they get to that point, there will be future negotiations with the club owners. In sum, the project is progressing with a temporary parking lot being built for the club, as required by zoning.

Comr. Phillips requested Mr. Ketchem address the concerns for the entire City regarding the bulk pickup issue.

Russell Ketchem, Solid Waste Manager, indicated that the new system has rolled out and it has been “less than stellar.” However, he informed that he has a list of the in-ground containers and their locations. They are planning a strategy to fill those in and will be contacting the property owners to do a one on one prior to performing any activity in this regard. In the meantime, the owners can still use the in-ground containers.

Additionally, Mr. Ketchem stated that the new system started last Monday but apparently, things were not going as planned. Waste Management has been partnering with the City since 1974, but for some reason “things got derailed.” Representatives from Waste Management are available for any questions and provide a brief update on the issue.

Mr. Ketchem indicated that he had a series of meetings, including one with the Regional President of Waste Management and the Director of Operations. In the meantime, Waste Management will be bringing in additional assets to get the neighborhoods cleaned up. In fact, Mr. Ketchem indicated that he has also brought in the City’s assets to assist with cleaning up the areas. There is some difficulty in completing the routes, which they are still trying to get to the reasons. He indicated that staff is expecting more assets tomorrow as far as “clam trucks” and so forth. The goal is to bring everything up to par and clean up the entire City this week.

Tony Spadaccio, Waste Management, indicated that it is obvious there has been a “rocky start” on this project. He explained it was a major undertaking across the board in implementing an entirely new system. In addition, it was a project that was trying and taxing to both Waste Management and the citizens of the City of Pompano Beach. He noted that days were changed and there was confusion on which days were to be the scheduled pickup for residents.

Additionally, Mr. Spadaccio acknowledged that they had a breakdown and failure in communication, which is outside the norm for their operations. Nevertheless, they are working on getting back on track with the services. In fact, they have committed assets and personnel to clean up the entire City to get it back on track by the end of the week.

Finally, Mr. Spadaccio apologized for the inconveniences that the residents have been experiencing and promised to do a good job to get back on course.

Comr. Phillips indicated that during the many years that the Waste Management has been operating in the City, the past week was the first time he has received several complaints. The streets are not only embarrassing, but dangerous; therefore, he is relieved to hear that they are working with additional assets to resolve the issue. Perhaps additional mailing could be sent out on the schedules. Finally, he suggested that the same communication with the City’s water bill could be utilized for the solid waste services.

Mayor Fisher indicated that stickers for the new days were placed on the carts and he wondered why the bulk pickup information was not included.

Mr. Spadaccio indicated that they had informed all the residents as to the schedule of the bulk pickup, and maps were provided regarding the days of collection as well. Therefore, he encouraged everyone to revisit the map and their collection days without assuming everything is the same as it was prior to the new collection schedules.

Comr. Phillips reiterated that a notice be sent with the water bills on the days of bulk pickup since this appears to be the problem area.

Mayor Fisher noted that there will be one bulk pickup per week, and the pickup will be scheduled on non-recycling days as it relates to the different routes.

Mr. Ketchem replied yes. In fact, he stated that it will be picked up on the opposite of the recycling day. Therefore, on the blue recycling container, if it says Monday and your other service day is Thursday, then the bulk pickup will be on Thursday.

Vice Mayor Burrie indicated that within her district they do not get City water, rather, they are utilizing County water so they do not receive a water bill from the City. In sum, everyone who receives City water will receive a notice except those residents who receive their water from the County.

Mr. Spadaccio explained that there will be trucks up and down the streets throughout the City that will not be on regular collection day, but it is an effort to comb the City thoroughly. Therefore, he urged everyone not to look at it as missed pickup, but to adhere to the scheduled day to put their bulk out for pickup.

Mayor Fisher indicated that until late this evening his regular collection had not yet been picked up, which was on schedule for pickup. Notwithstanding, there is some frustration regarding the current issue.

Comr. Moss indicated that when days were changed for the Palm Aire residents of approximately 7,000 units no one was notified of the change.

Comr. Hardin indicated that he has also received phone calls from angry residents. He is unsure how or who dropped the ball; however, this matter should be resolved by the end of the week as promised.

Black History Program on February 26, 2016 – Hazel K. Armbrister, President, Rock Road Restoration Historical Group, Inc., 1808 Northwest 6th Avenue, Pompano Beach, FL 33060, stated that on Sunday, February 28, 2016 at 4:00 p.m. the group had their Black History program at the E. Pat Larkins' Center. She indicated that the US Post Office had joined in with the celebration. In addition, she mentioned that the Post Office issues a special stamp each year during Black History month. However, this year, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Carte Willie and Lou Lou Clarke, who works for the Post Office, solicited them to agree to give this accolade to the City of Pompano Beach. The stamp was unveiled at the service, and they presented a copy of the stamp to the three recipients of the Frank and Florence Ali Entrepreneurial award. They were Deacon Edgar Goodrum, Deacon Eugene Peterson, former owner of the Ali Building, and Derrick Phillips.

Ms. Armbrister displayed at the meeting, the larger version of the stamp presented to the Rock Road Restoration Historical Group. She indicated that Mayor Fisher enjoyed it at the program so he encouraged her to share it with the rest of the City. She explained that the stamp is a depiction of Richard Allen who was an Episcopal priest that organized the first African Methodist Episcopal Church in the City of Pompano Beach, which is the current Bethel AME on Northwest 3rd Avenue, originally named Church Street.

Finally, Ms. Armbrister indicated that the stamp will be framed and made to reside at the Ali Building in Office number four (4).

King, Owner/Director, King’s School of the Arts Inc., 2601 Northwest 12th Street, Kings Academy, 2600 MLK Boulevard, Suite 10, Pompano Beach, FL 33069, complained about a few incidents he and his school have been having with the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA). He indicated that it is difficult to do things with the CRA because of a couple of run-ins he had with them. He said he has been given the run around, such as emails not being responded to and so forth, when it is time to do something with the CRA.</p> <p>Mr. King outlined a particular incident last Wednesday, when he tried to find out why the children could not perform and do certain things with the CRA. In sum, the CRA called the police because they felt he and his children were acting ignorant. However, he and the children had already left the building of City Hall. Nevertheless, the police caught up with the bus of children and pulled them over which he did not understand this action.</p> <p>Additionally, Mr. King indicated that the next day he returned to the CRA office in City Hall to find out why the police were involved and what the issue was. At that point, he stated that Ms. Gallagher had indicated to the City Manager that they did not call the police, yet she told him that she did call the Police. Notwithstanding, on his questioning why the police were called, Ms. Gallagher got up and “pushed me out of her office” and from that point he called the Sheriff’s Office (BSO) as he already felt unsafe around the CRA and the BSO. He alleged that they have their eyes on him as they continue to watch him at every event.</p> <p>In sum, Mr. King stated that he is unable to visit City Hall as they issued a “Trespassing Order,” which will stop him from paying his water bill at the building or doing any other transaction with any other department with the City. Therefore, he wanted to know what he needed to do from this point in order to resolve the matter.</p> <p>Mayor Fisher indicated that there appears to be two issues, one with the CRA. However, the CRA Board/Commission meets on next Tuesday, at which time, Mr. King could return regarding the CRA incident. In the meantime, there were several accusations received regarding Mr. King. Therefore, the Commission will request City Manager Beach along with the CRA staff to provide a report of what incidents have occurred, after which, City Manager Beach will make his recommendations regarding the matter.</p>

Mr. King indicated that he had already spoken with the City Manager, who indicated to him that he was wrong.

Dennis W. Beach, City Manager explained that Mr. King spoke with him specifically about the trespass order that had been applied. However, he asked him to submit a letter describing his version of the events, at which time he would review and respond to him.

Mayor Fisher reiterated that Mr. King provide the City Manager with his complaints in writing with the hope of resolving his issues.

Agenda Items for Community Benefit – Vicente Thrower, 1890 Northwest 6th Avenue, Pompano Beach, FL, indicated there are several items on the agenda that he hopes some consideration can be given to suggestions from the Mayor’s Stimulus Task Force about the community benefit program. Notwithstanding, currently, on the agenda are very high dollar amounts to be approved, which he hopes, as these items are discussed, the Commission would consider the monitoring of some of these projects.

Rooming House – Bonnye Daise, 131 Northwest 15th Court, Pompano Beach, FL 33060, stated that she lived at this address for over forty years and it has been zoned for single-family homes. However, someone purchased the house next door to her house, and is currently operating it as a rooming house. She mentioned they installed an air conditioning unit, which should be at least three feet from the property line but it is approximately one foot. Ms. Daise indicated that she is unable to get anyone to come out to investigate the matter.

Mayor Fisher indicated that City Manager Beach will meet with the City’s Code Compliance Manager, Mario Sotolongo regarding the matter. Additionally, Mayor Fisher recommended that Ms. Daise meet with Mr. Sotolongo and provide him with the proper address of the property, where the violations have occurred.

Comr. Phillips indicated that they tried to get a response from the Code Compliance Manager, but Ms. Daise’s problem is indicative of what is being experienced in the Northwest neighborhoods. People are quietly converting single family homes to rooming/boarded houses. He commended Ms. Daise for bringing this information forward. In addition, Comr. Phillips indicated that he has received several complaints, so perhaps code compliance may need some help in this regard.

Dennis W. Beach, City Manager encouraged anyone with similar issues to call his office directly if there is no response after they have contacted any other respective department.

Mr. Beach explained that one of the biggest issues the City has is the same issue under discussion. Therefore, he urged residents to contact his office if after trying to contact departments such as Building, Zoning, Code Enforcement and so forth.

Comr. Phillips encouraged Ms. Daise to call the Broward Sheriff’s office as well.

Ali Cultural Events – Shanna Benson, Marketing Manager, Pompano Beach CRA, 100 West Atlantic Boulevard, Pompano Beach, FL 33069, introduced Keila Rodriguez, CRA Cultural Arts Marketing Coordinator, who invited everyone out to attend certain events on Friday, March 11, 2016.

- On Sunday, March 13, 2016 a performance of the Steel Brothers Band, which is an event, that takes place the second Sunday of each month.

Comr. Hardin indicated that he read the Sun Sentinel article and commended Ms. Rodriquez and the team on doing a good job with it.

Mayor Fisher also thanked Anne Siren from the Pelican newspaper for the article on the event.

Parking Tickets – Rick Massimi, 261, Southeast 12th Street, Pompano Beach, FL 33060, indicated that over the weekend he received his fourth (4th) parking ticket that was issued in error. He explained that after spending \$16.00 in parking, at the end of day, he was issued a \$35 parking ticket after he returned from diving.

Mr. Massimi indicated that he is aware the matter will be resolved, but he had to take time to get Denison Parking to resolve the issue. Notwithstanding, he believes the parking issue needs to be fixed. Therefore, he suggested the Commission might want to consider allowing a homestead parking pass.

Canal Waste – Mr. Massimi complained that for the past few weeks he has seen petroleum products going back and forth from the dock. There is oil and petroleum in the City’s Canal. He has subsequently contacted city staff, who reacted rather quickly. However, a BSO marine officer informed him that there was a strong east wind and the canal was moving. Shortly after, he received a call from the zoning department informing him that they will be getting to the bottom of it. The next day the water was calm and he took a video of the petroleum and tried to call all the persons that had previously contacted him with no success.

Mr. Massimi indicated that the video will show the petroleum that is in front of his dock as well as other neighbors further down the canal. He said he just wants to see the canal cleaned up. In fact, he says there are over fifty dive sites in the City, where people from all over the world come to dive. Therefore, to have oil making its way to the ocean where these sites are is not good. These canals need to be maintained.

- Golf Course – The City spent millions of dollars on this project but there are still problems with dredging the ponds.
- West CRA – Millions have been squandered on land purchases.
- Fire station – A Certificate of Occupancy (CO) was done, and one million dollars was spent on a bond. Notwithstanding, there are lawsuits forthcoming with construction disasters.
- Traffic Light Permit – was inadvertently left out.
- Beach Parking Meters – Mr. Ryan inquired who paid for the renewal.

Randolph Brown, Utilities Director, indicated that they have been discussing the project with the Air Park and they were notified that the well house would have to be moved by the year 2020. Therefore, the study was initiated to find out the construction costs to put it in the Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) for the future.</p> <p>Comr. Dockswell inquired why were the City's General and Utility funds being utilized to accomplish this move for the Air Park extension rather than the Air Park fund. He would prefer to see the funds coming from the Air Park fund rather than to utilize funds from the general fund that could be used otherwise to improve the City's water and reuse services.</p> <p>Dennis W. Beach, City Manager indicated that the project that Mr. Brown is referring to is the extension of the Taxi-way, which is four years away. He indicated that if this was going to become part of the extension project Mr. Brown would need to wait until that funding in that project was underway to get this done. Therefore, he asked if there was a reason to bring this forward at this time.</p> <p>Mr. Brown responded that he was being proactive to make sure they had the plans in place, the timing right, and funds set aside to accomplish it in that time period.</p> <p>Mr. Beach indicated that if Comr. Dockswell is successful in getting the project for the extension paid for through the Air Park fund, then staff would bring this back at that time.</p> <p>Mayor Fisher indicated that at least it would allow the planning for 2020 and at that time the funding could be addressed. Therefore, if necessary and the study are paid for, he asked if the fund could be reimbursed.</p> <p>Mr. Brown indicated that he would have to check with the Finance Director to see if there is a way to do that.</p> <p>Comr. Hardin noted that Comr. Dockswell's comments are valid, suggested tabling the item, and have staff provide the pros and cons.</p>

In fact, he said, last week he was out conducting a monitoring visit. He found them to be in full compliance based on the monitoring.</p> <p>Mr. Korman explained that they have a waiting list to occupy Phase II, but currently, they cannot occupy Phase II units.</p> <p>Vicente Thrower, 1890 Northwest 6th Avenue, Pompano Beach, FL, asked to date, what is the total amount that the City has given to the project.</p> <p>Mr. Kormna replied that Phase I received \$950,000 and Phase II so far has received \$186,000 so this will be an additional \$100,000, which will equal the developer's original request of Neighborhood Stabilization Program (NSP) funds of \$1.2 million, although the request was not approved.</p> <p>Mr. Thrower asked if the City has been monitoring the economics of the project because in the past when money was given, it was done through the HUD process of NSP funding.</p> <p>Mr. Korman replied there is no NSP funding but rather it is Home funding. Home funding has become and continues to become more restrictive. It requires underwriting analysis, and requires ongoing monitoring.</p> <p>Mr. Beach reiterated that the question was regarding job creation and if this is part of the project.</p> <p>Meryl Wolfe, 2100 Hollywood Boulevard, Hollywood, FL, was available to answer questions on the issue.</p> <p>Mr. Thrower requested that staff provide the economic benefits of this project, as well as how this would be monitored should it get approved.</p> <p>Comr. Phillips inquired if the City has only contributed approximately \$1.2 million, which does not include the Community Housing Development Organization (CHODO) that \$1 million was funneled through.</p> <p>Mr. Korman replied that the Federal Home Loan Bank of Atlanta funded it.</p>

Comr. Phillips indicated that it appears this project is ongoing and he is unhappy with the way the funds are assigned, when this money could be used for people purchasing homes. The City is assisting an entity that possibly has enough money to pay for it themselves. He clarified that this is not a bad project. There are a number of residents that find it restrictive and strict, but there needs to be some rules. Nevertheless, there is the need to lighten up a bit.

Additionally, Comr. Phillips expressed concerns in terms of the priorities of how the City is trying to assist its residents, so, staff could prioritize this a little better. In sum, he will be voting against the item and he explained his reasons. Finally, if the City has until September to assist other residents who could utilize the money in other areas of the city, then staff should come up with a plan.

Mr. Korman explained that the cost of Phase I was \$40 million. The primary burden of the costs has been borne by Florida Housing Finance Corporation and Broward County using its own funds. The low income housing tax credits were the primary vehicle for financing the bulk of the transaction, together with the developer contributions.

In addition, Phase II cost \$15 million, and structured the same way as the \$40 million. In fact, the City is the most junior lienholder. Although these are important funds to the City, they are being used exactly how they are supposed to be used, that is the creation of affordable housing. This will now become an affordable housing development of approximately 350 units.

Comr. Dockswell asked how much the other revenue sources are contributing to this latest round.

Mr. Korman replied that the latest round would be \$286,000 and since it cost \$15 million everything comes from the remaining sources.

In response to Comr. Dockswell's question, Mr. Korman responded that he is unaware of any of the senior lienholders who have to "pony up" additional funding, which was not of interest to staff.

Therefore, the City does not know what the source is for the remainder of the \$500,000.</p> <p>Comr. Dockswell indicated that he would be voting against the item, as the City should be better stewards of the US taxpayers' money.</p> <p>Comr. Hardin indicated that he supports the project as it furthers the goals the City has had for a long time, which have been espoused by the current commission. He mentioned this is an affordable housing community with a tremendous reputation from a developer, which has done other affordable housing communities in the City of Pompano Beach and has done a great job. Currently, they are nearing the finishing line on this project that has transformed that area. He thanked Ms. Carrillo for finding other funding to get this project underway. He also thanked Cornerstone for transforming an area that was unattractive to what it is today.</p> <p>Finally, Comr. Hardin indicated this is an example of the City investing home funds and he is supportive of the effort.</p> <p>Comr. Moss stated that the amount of money the City has invested in the project in comparison to the value of the project in its entirety and the contribution to the betterment of the community is "chump change." As a result, he plans to support it.</p> <p>Vice Mayor Burrie commented that the project started some time ago and one of the areas where Captiva wanted to take the money from was the NSP, which she fought against as it is definitely for single-family homes. Thereafter, Captiva redid their work resulting in not utilizing the NSP funds. She agreed with Comr. Hardin that this is a small investment in comparison to what the developer has put into it and it is affordable housing.</p> <p>Comr. Dockswell clarified that none of his comments are based on the quality of the project and what it has done for the neighborhood. However, if the City chose not to allocate the \$100,000, then the project would still be completed. Nevertheless, it would allow another six (6) months for staff to determine how this amount could be utilized in the neighborhoods. Therefore, to allow use of the fund without getting the chance to see what else could be done with it is a demonstration of poor stewardship of taxpayers' money.</p>

Vicente Thrower, 1890 Northwest 6th Avenue, Pompano Beach, FL, stated that there are several other items in this contract. However, he wanted to know the economic benefits for contracts similar to the subject matter. He opined that one company appears to be getting most of the work and there needs to be some monitoring to ask for reports as to the economic benefits to the City.

Comr. Hardin understood that reports were going to be provided to the City Commission from the contractors to include a list of people hired and so forth. Historically, they would be providing reports as it relates to the economic impact in the City. He asked if that has started yet.

Mr. McCaughan responded that he will follow-up and get a summary report to the Commission as they have requested. Nevertheless, he indicated that it is in the details of the extensive pages of backup material so it may have been overlooked. He provided a breakdown of the two things involved with the project, and the various bids that the company had to solicit to get the job done.

Mayor Fisher thanked Otis Thomas, Purchasing Director, who has done a tremendous job in the summary report showing how many persons in Pompano Beach were contacted and so forth. He also thanked Mr. McCaughan for the update on the committees.

Comr. Phillips indicated that this is a quality company. He also thanked staff for doing an excellent job and for working diligently on the community benefit component. However, he expressed concerns with Burkhardt, as the company name has repeatedly appeared before the Commission. So, with a company benefiting with so many projects in the City, the question becomes, "What is in it for us?" Notwithstanding, the people within the City's neighborhoods need to be involved in the jobs being generated. Therefore, he inquired about the total amount that Burkhardt has made in direct/indirect money from the projects they may have done for the City. He asked if staff can provide those numbers to the Commission.

There will be times when the assumption is not met but there are going to be times when the assumption is exceeded, and over time, they should balance each other out.</p> <p>In response to Mr. Terwilliger's question, Mr. Green indicated that they could not predict the future nor asset. But the assumed rate of return is based on the asset allocation of the fund, as well as the capital market assumptions used by the investment consultant that guides the boards in assisting with setting the assumption. Therefore, they do not take into account anticipated events that they cannot take to actually occurring.</p> <p>Comr. Dockswell asked for clarification on what the return was in the most recent fiscal year for which there is data supplied. It appears that they are saying that the Plan did better than forecasted.</p> <p>Mr. Green replied it did. He explained that the market return for the year was a negative .2% but since they utilized the smoothing method that recognizes gains and losses over a five (5) year period, they had some unrecognized asset gains to help offset that loss. So, on an actuarial basis the return was 8.7% although next year it is not likely to be that unless there is an offsetting higher than 8% rate of return.</p> <p>Comr. Dockswell cited page 17 of the Actuarial Valuation Report as of October 1, 2015, provided as backup material, where it indicated that in the fiscal year 2014-2015 the retirement fund lost \$12 million, and asked for an explanation how this happened.</p> <p>Mr. Green confirmed that it had a negative investment return of \$12 million. Adam and Josh Adams are the owners of Golden Pond located on Dixie Highway, but are desirous to move their pawnshop from being a tenant in a building to one day owning their own property. However, the current proposed zoning allows check cashing and alternative payday businesses to be located in four zoning districts. Pawnshops remain in the category that they have always been allowed in, which is the B-4 zoning district only. Therefore, she presented the attached PowerPoint document highlighting their proposal to the Commission.</p> <p>In sum, they are requesting that the City eliminate the restrictions between pawnshops and check cashing stores for the distance separation requirements.</p> <p>Ms. Friedman explained the items in the study that included the uses titled alternative financial uses. This term was not created for the study, rather it is an accepted term nationally that includes an umbrella of uses that operate outside of the traditional banking or financial institutions. In the case of the study, staff focused its research on check cashing stores, payday loan providers and pawnshops. In sum, staff is proposing a solution that reflects the results of the study, which reflects the clustering seen in the community. Also, it reflects the location of these uses particularly in or adjacent to the northwest CRA. Therefore, to address them as separate uses completely disregards the concept of the umbrella of uses called alternative financing uses. Finally, staff does not support treating them as separate uses but instead does support the idea that they have secondary effects that are only enhanced when they are co-located.</p> <p>Mark E. Karen Friedman, Principal Planner, stated that in 2011, in an effort to incentivize redevelopment of the Atlantic Boulevard Overlay District (AOD), Ordinance 2011-31 revised the parking standards for the AOD. It did not require parking for five (5) years within the district. The purpose of the ordinance is two-fold that is, to continue to relax the off-street parking requirement, which is an important redevelopment tool. Also, to amend the requirements to reflect the outcome of the moratorium, as well as the fact that there are uses that speak more to the purpose of the AOD. Therefore, the Text Amendments include parking modifications, except they are tailored to the specific uses, and in working with the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) staff, they desire to see incentivize redevelopment coming to the area.

Bruce Volkel, 2700 Southeast 2nd Street, Pompano Beach, FL, stated that he is aware that there are parking issues on Atlantic Boulevard and especially at the back of Harbor Village. However, on the east side there are no sidewalks; therefore, if off-street parking will be allowed, people are already walking on the side of the road to visit any of the restaurants in the neighborhood. So, for the safety of the residents he is interested in the off-street parking, and requested more information on the matter.

Ms. Friedman noted that she will take Mr. Volkel's information and email him a copy of the backup. Also, she stated that the CRA is focused on parking and the need for it. So, she will ensure that his contact information is provided to the east CRA staff, if they do not have it.

Comr. Dockswell stated that the relaxation of parking requirements have been something he was never comfortable about, and was planning to advocate forcefully against this ordinance. However, he has discussed with a number of people and can now see the utility of it. Therefore, he would like to propose an amendment to the ordinance on second reading. He then provided details on the idea behind it.

In sum, Comr. Dockswell noted that he desired to see it codified so that if certain qualifications are met for reduced parking requirements, a plan is in place on the accommodation of the parking demand. Also, he is hoping that some solution either in hand or that the City would be developing the solution in support of the use desired. Subsequently, Comr. Dockswell recommended that the item be passed on first reading but provide amendments on the second reading.

Mayor Fisher responded that the Commission has requested the updates from staff.

Mayor Fisher asked Horacio Danovich, CIP Manager if all the easements from the property owners have been completed.

Mr. Danovich replied that they are all completed.

Comr. Phillips commented that as these things are done he would like to include his stand of "me too."

Comr. Moss asked for an explanation on a Manager-at-Risk contract.

Mr. Danovich responded that there are different ways of managing a project. Therefore, a construction manager-at-risk is retained for the purposes of being an extension of the City. So, the manager-at-risk would be responsible to do the purchasing, bidding and finding of the contractors instead of the City. In sum, they do the research to find the best prices and products for the City as it relates to suppliers, subcontractors, electrical, irrigation, landscape, and so forth. Thereafter, he/she would present these to the City for final decisions.

Comr. Moss asked how many contractors bid on this contract.

Mr. Sfiropoulos replied that there were seven (7) which were shortlisted to three (3) and Burkhardt ranked the highest.

Mr. Berman indicated, as discussed previously, this is a lawsuit challenging the City's sign code. The discussions will be out of the Sunshine per statute. They are limited to settlement negotiations or strategy sessions related to litigation expenditures. Therefore, staff is requesting a date of March 22, 2016 and will be working to make a convenient time certain for everybody.

City Clerk – No Report.

Commissioner Barry J. Dockswell – No Report.

Commissioner Rex Hardin – Waste Management Garbage Issues – Comr. Hardin requested City Manager Beach to be sure to point out to Public Works Director Rob McCaughan, and Solid Waste Manager Russ Ketchem the discussions that the Commission had with Waste Management at this meeting.

Commissioner Barry Moss – Vandalized Car – Comr. Moss reported that last week his car was broken into and his briefcase stolen. However, he thanked Major Hale and his team for showing up quickly and checking for fingerprints. Hopefully, they will be able to find the culprits. Unfortunately, all his documents relating to the Commission were stolen. Therefore, he will be requesting people to generate new documents. For example, business cards with email address and phone numbers are all gone, so he will be requesting those again from employees.

Removal of Advisory Board Members – Comr. Moss indicated that there was a Memo from the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board asking the Commission to remove two (2) of the people from that Board. They established their own rules about attendance and two of the members namely; Mr. Bechert and Ms. Almonord who are alternates are requested to be removed. Therefore, he suggested that City Manager Beach comes up with a process whereby people who are not showing up for meetings can be removed. He is unsure what the city code allows, but this is a big inconvenience for those people who show up and there is no work.

Additionally, Comr. Moss noted that again, the Budget Review Committee has failed to meet for lack of a quorum, which is another Board that he has a problem with their lack of meetings. These members are either going to participate, get off the Board, or the board should be terminated.

Mayor Fisher indicated that he has had extensive discussions with City Attorney Berman and City Clerk Hammond and unfortunately, there is no mechanism to remove physically those two members. However, the City Clerk could ask the Commissioner who appointed them to ask for their resignation, which would be the best way to resolve their attendance issue.

Mark E. Berman, City Attorney confirmed that would be the best way. Mr. Berman added that there are sections in the Code for various boards for removal but not a general section. Therefore, the most fair and reasonable way is to contact them to determine their interest to serve on the board.

Comr. Hardin said that he thought the Memo under discussion was interesting because the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board on their own decided that their alternate members are required to attend all the meetings. While he does not have a problem with that; however, that is not how it is spelled out in the ordinance.

Thereafter, a discussion followed among the Commission and the City Attorney on how alternate members are perceived in attending the meetings and the process involved.

Comr. Hardin indicated that the process where a Board decides that alternates must attend all meetings and if not, they should be taken off the board is not a fair process.

Mr. Berman indicated that he questioned the process for alternate members because normally those members are not held to the same requirements of attendance as the regular board members.

Comr. Moss suggested that this information is communicated to the Boards so that they have a better understanding of it.

Mayor Fisher requested Ms. Hammond to provide the Commission minutes to the Boards.

Comr. Dockswell recalled having a discussion with the previous City Attorney regarding this issue. He thought since the Commission appoints people to the Boards they should be able to remove them from the Boards with a motion.

Mr. Berman responded that there should be a reason for removal. Usually, most Board appointments are, unless there is maleficence or they have done something wrong there is no reason to remove them from the board. Currently, there is no process in place. Therefore, a general process needs to be considered that will apply to all boards, potentially for failure to attend or failure to be available if a person is an alternate over a period of time, in essence something that is fair. It should not dissuade volunteers that the City relies upon from participating on these boards.

Comr. Dockswell desires a clear process that the Commission should either be able to remove someone by motion or by what other means that is in place.

Mr. Berman explained that the concern at this time is what the City has or does not have in place. To remove someone, discuss someone or undermine a Commissioners' appointment and letting them know that this person appointed has been a problem, and can it be looked into. At this point, there is no mandate for removal, but it warrants investigation, communication and a determination of a desire to serve and then staff could look into fine tuning it, which he agrees needs to be done.

Comr. Dockswell indicated that he had intentionally not appointed someone for quite some time since the previous person he had appointed resigned. Actually, when he became commissioner, the Budget Review Committee was terminated and he advocated to get it reinstated, which it was. However, his experience is that it has become a hotbed of non-productive dissention. People who had a more positive intention over time have since resigned.

Additionally, Comr. Dockswell indicated that he would be open to disbanding it again, as twice it has not worked.

MOTION: To direct the City Attorney to prepare a Resolution to disband the Budget Review Advisory Committee.

Vice Mayor Burrie indicated that she is unable to get anyone to serve on this board. Therefore, she agrees to disband the Board.

Comr. Phillips commented that the prior Budget Review Committee got some components of the criteria for fund balance.

Comr. Phillips stated the he found out that the City Clerk's Office has a system that if members are not serving correctly on boards they can be asked to acquiesce their will, which has happened to him. His understanding is that alternates are called if the current membership is not present. However, if an alternate is absent for a meeting because there is already a full quorum of members, then that person should not be penalized for not attending the meeting. Therefore, he is pleased that this matter will be explored to come up with a process.

Commissioner Edward Phillips – Posters on Flag Poles – Comr. Phillips indicated that he and his community are very frustrated with posters on all the City and County's flagpoles, and other areas being used for these posters. He does not believe the Public Works or Parks and Recreation Departments should be "charged" repeatedly to remove those posters, while the persons putting them up are not penalized. Therefore, there should be a process to ensure the offenders are penalized.

Mayor Fisher indicated that the Broward Sheriff's Office, as well as the City Manager have been working with code compliance on how to get to these promoters to have them penalized.

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Dennis W. Beach, City Manager, responded that this has not yet been worked out, as there are a number of legal impediments to hold the violators accountable and to prosecute them for this. The City Attorney's office has provided communication that they would continue to ponder how the City can access these people, and how to get to them to penalize them for this type of activity.

Mr. Berman explained that when they send threatening letters to the clubs, they disclaim the activity and indicate the promoters, whom nobody knows, is responsible for the act. Apparently, these promoters are hiring kids to go out there. However, the law is in place to catch them in the act, which is difficult. Notwithstanding, some offenders have been caught, prosecuted, and incarcerated; but, they will continue to pursue innovative ways to dissuade this activity.

Thereafter, there was an extensive discussion among the Commission and the City Attorney on the hurdles involved in trying to get this matter resolved.

Railroad Tracks – Comr. Phillips appealed for legislators help with the railroad tracks. He indicated that in the past outreach has been made to the County and Public Works department, but the problem persists. Therefore, he requested that the City Commission provide the ability for someone to contact all the congressional representatives and senators who represent the City of Pompano Beach to provide them with all the prior accumulated data regarding this issue. Finally, Comr. Phillips indicated that as this is an election year, perhaps the City would be more successful in getting a response regarding this very long outstanding matter.

Chicken Issues – Comr. Phillips indicated that the “chicks and the biddies” are continuing to be a source of nuisance on the streets. It is now one year and three months and this issue has not been resolved.

Ali and BaCa Building – Comr. Phillips reported that he has attended several activities and events at both buildings and have been impressed with the activities. However, there needs to be some tweaking, but the organizers at the centers are doing their best to respond to the City, as well as the people in the Northwest community.

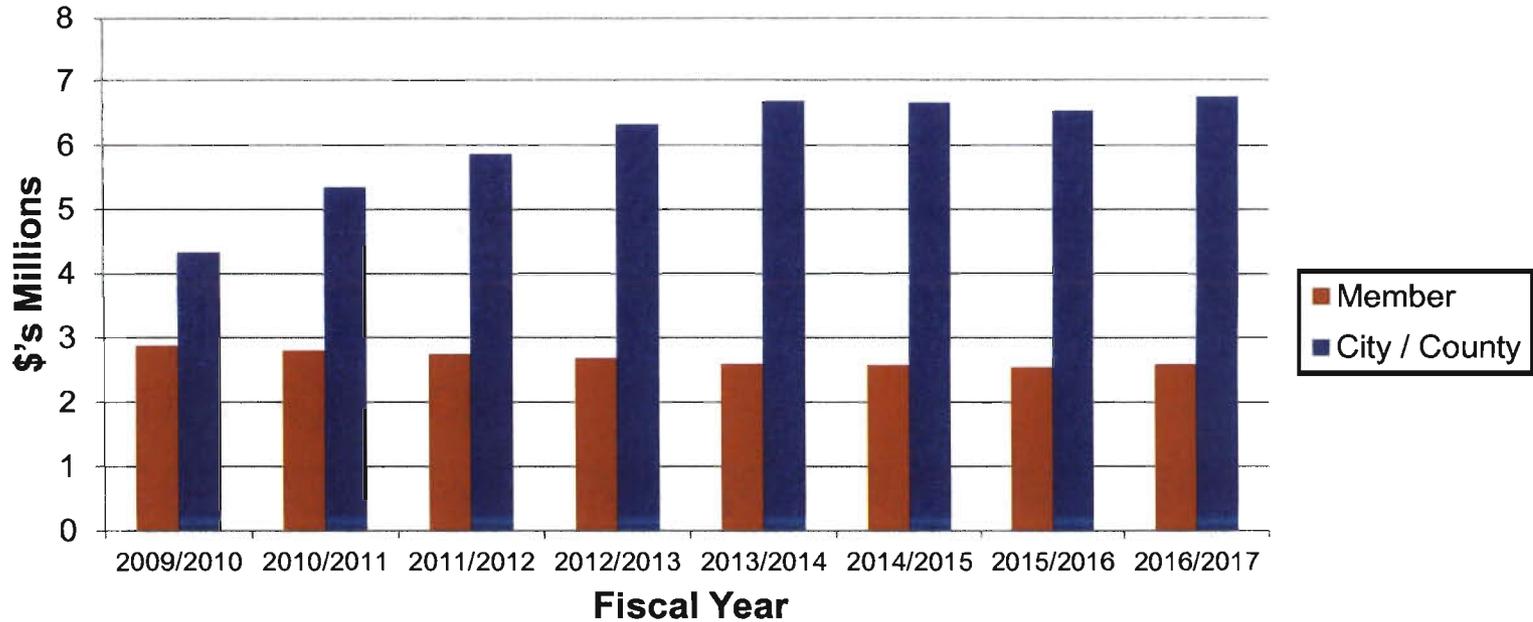

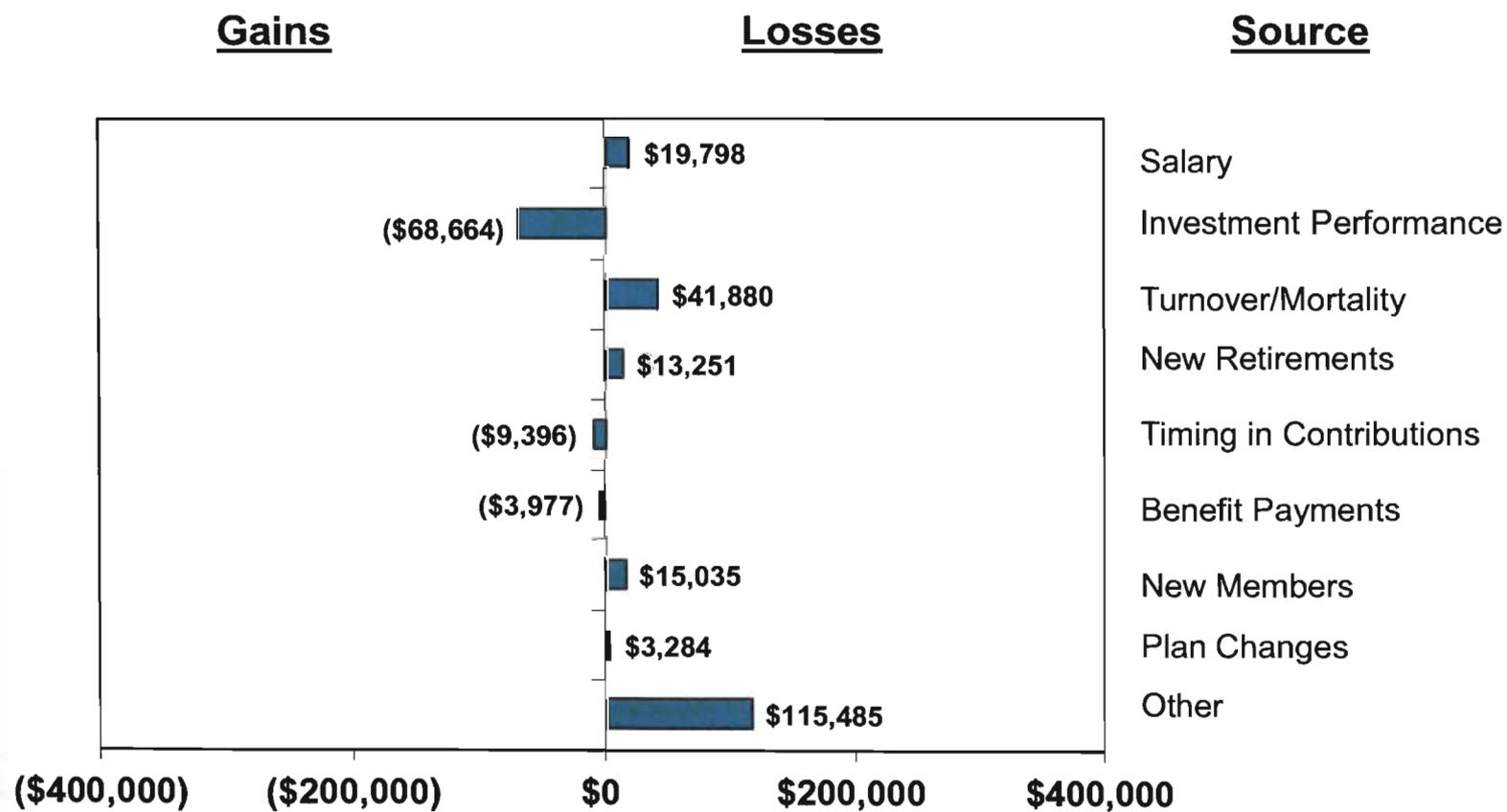

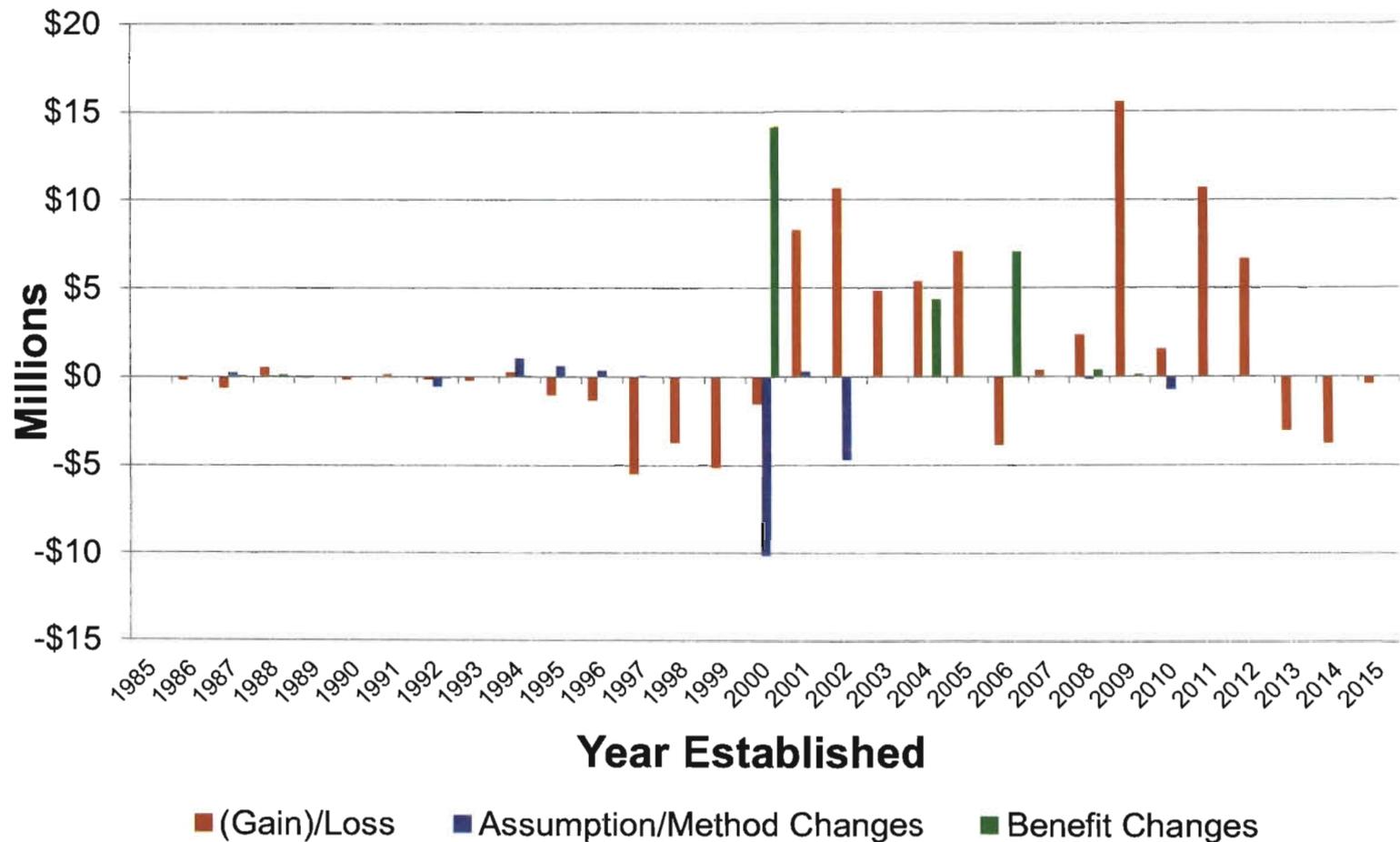

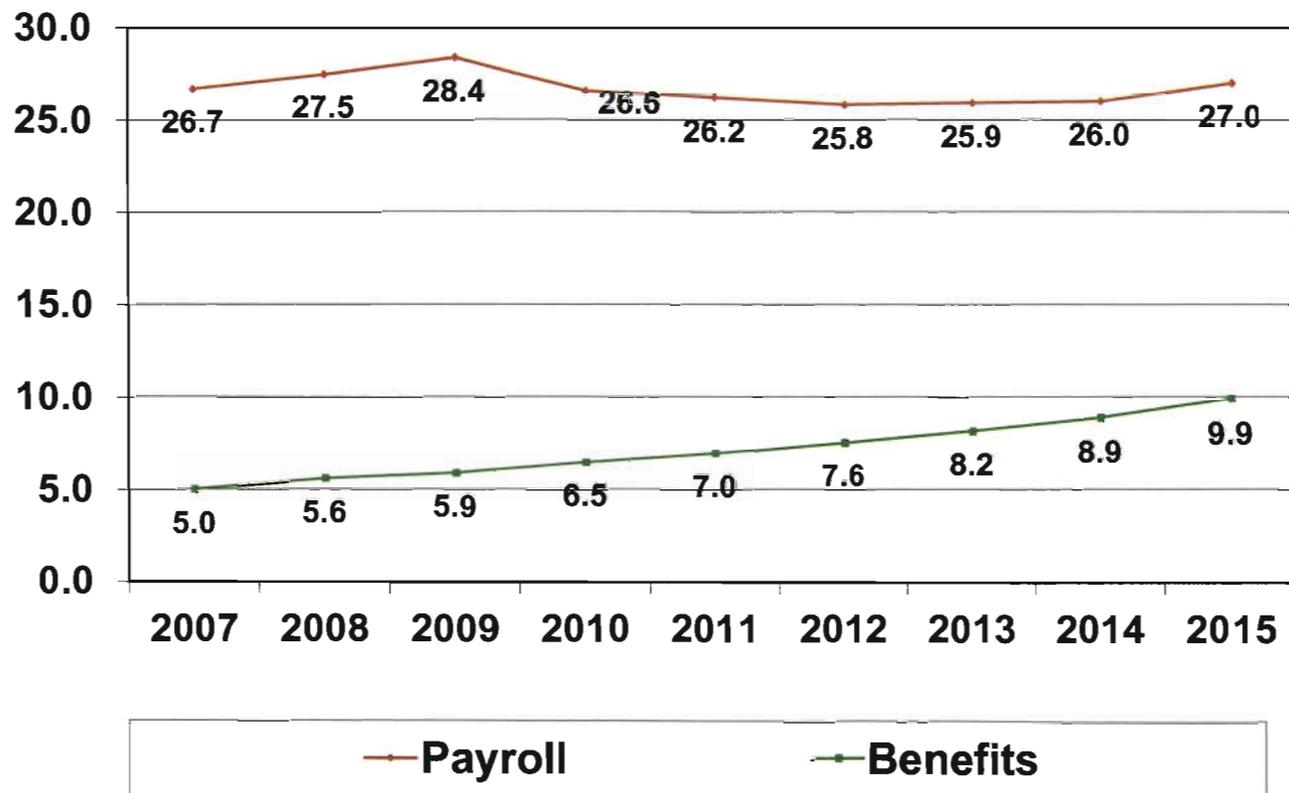
Changes In Unfunded Contribution from Prior Year



Unfunded Liability Amortization Bases as of October 1, 2015

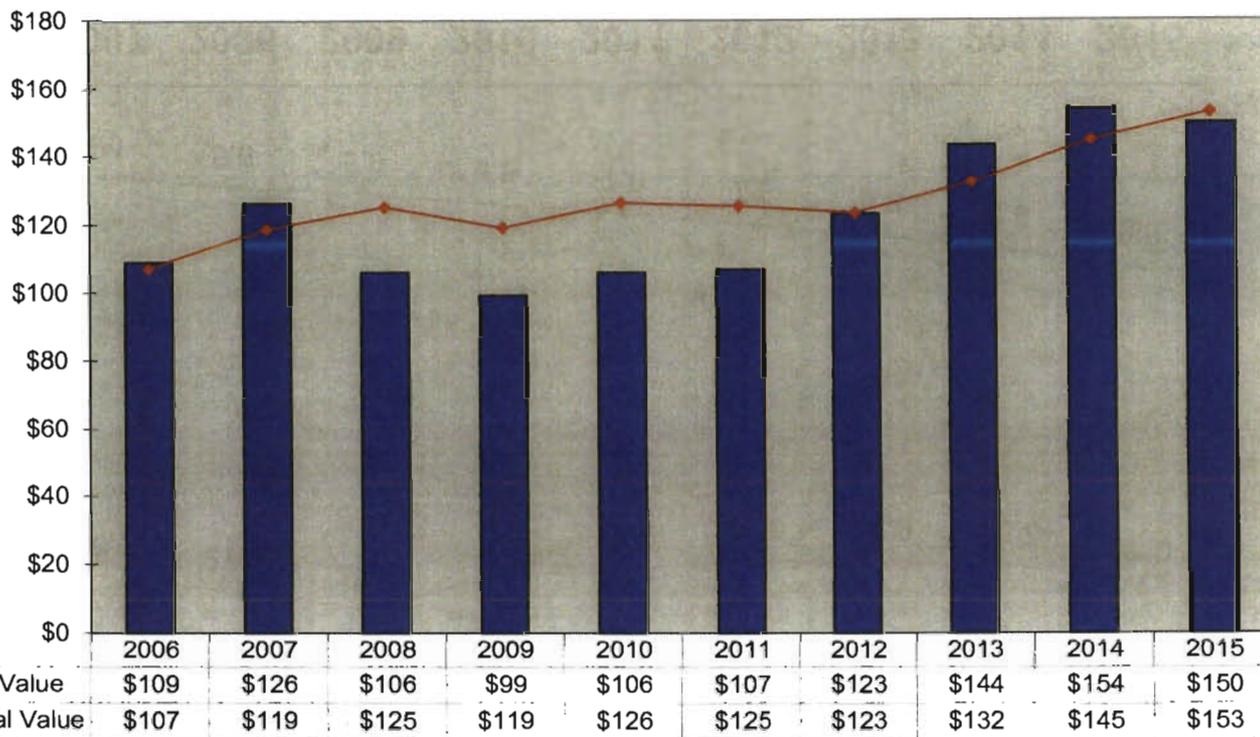

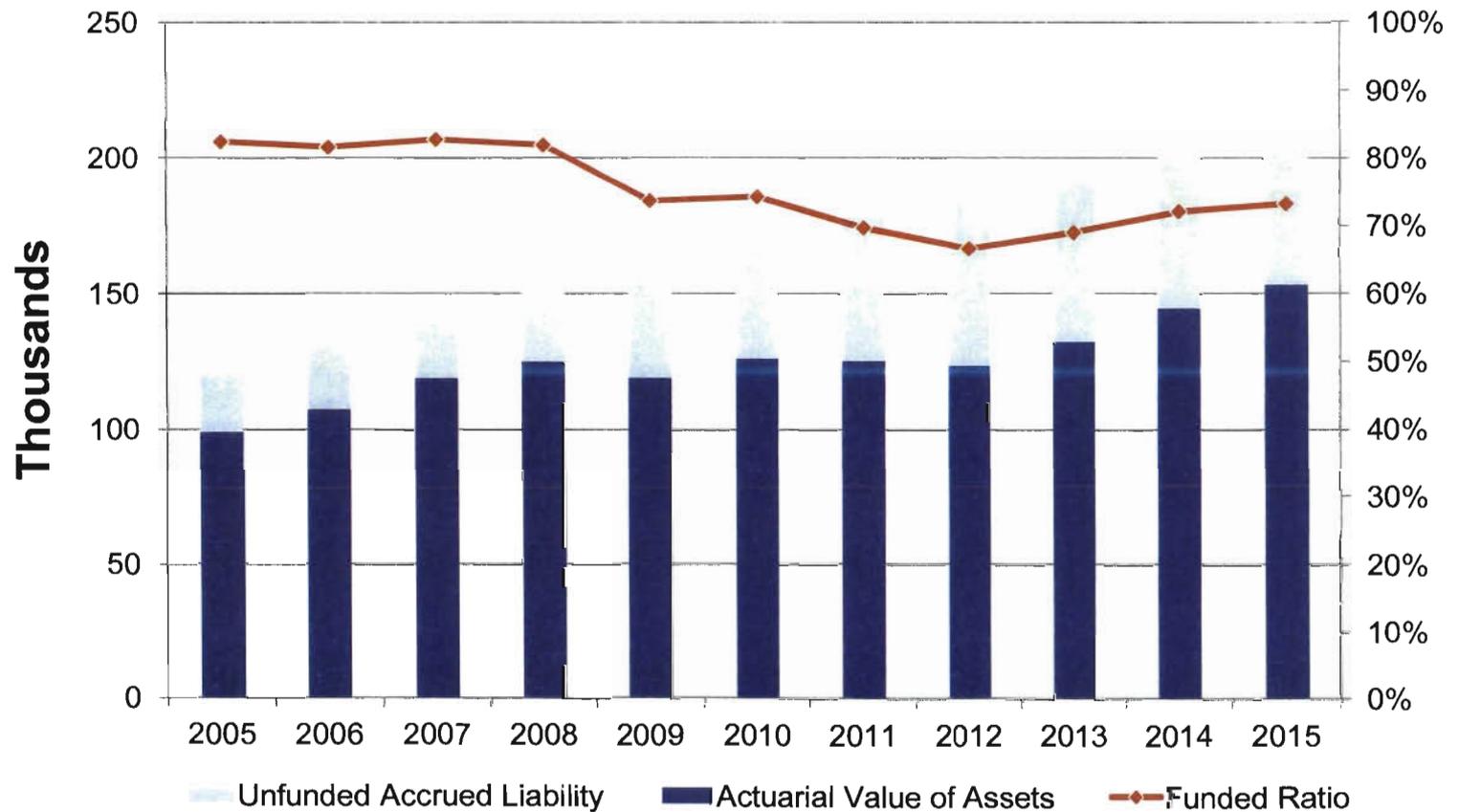

Historical Accrued Liability and Funded Ratio

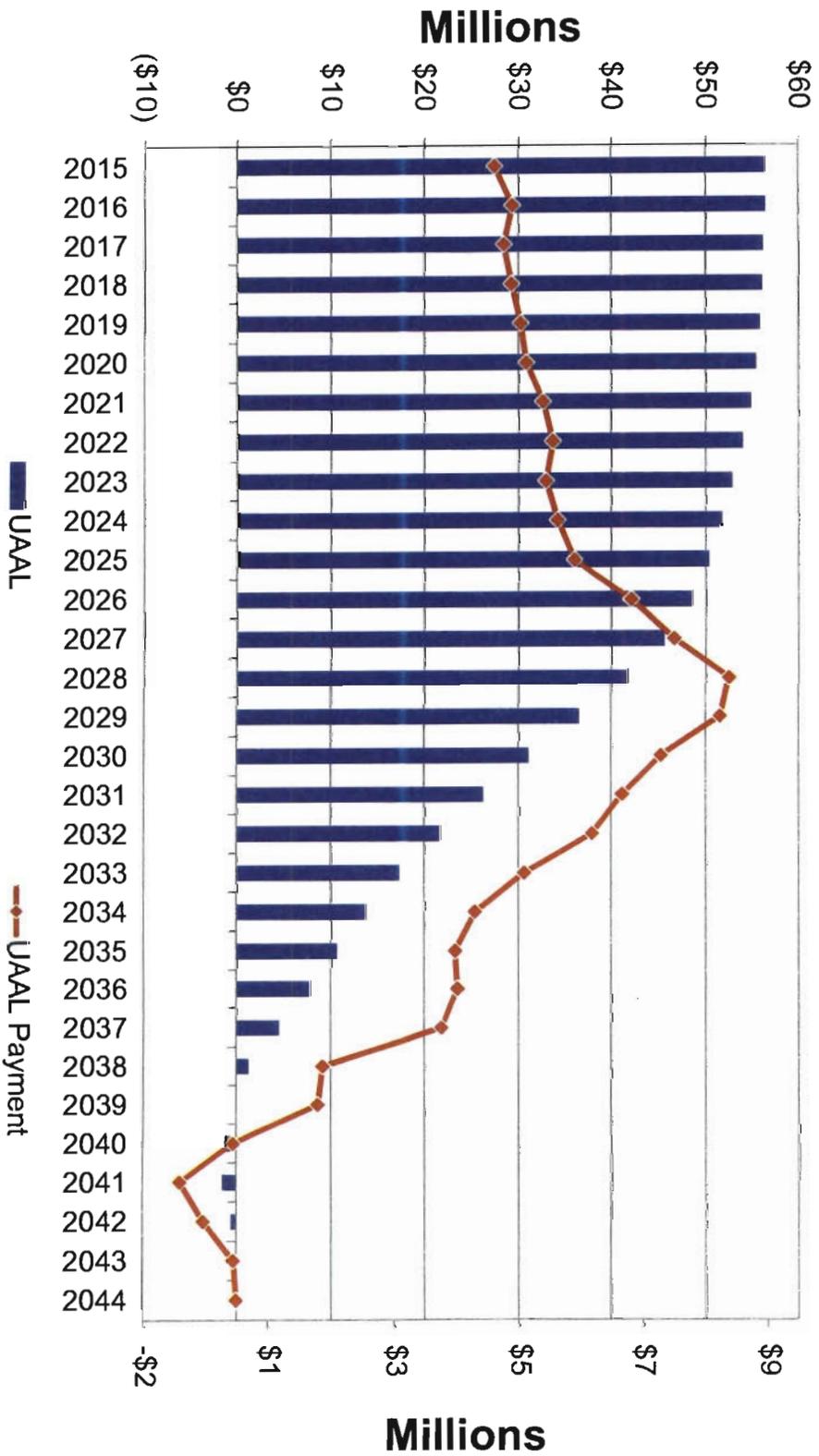

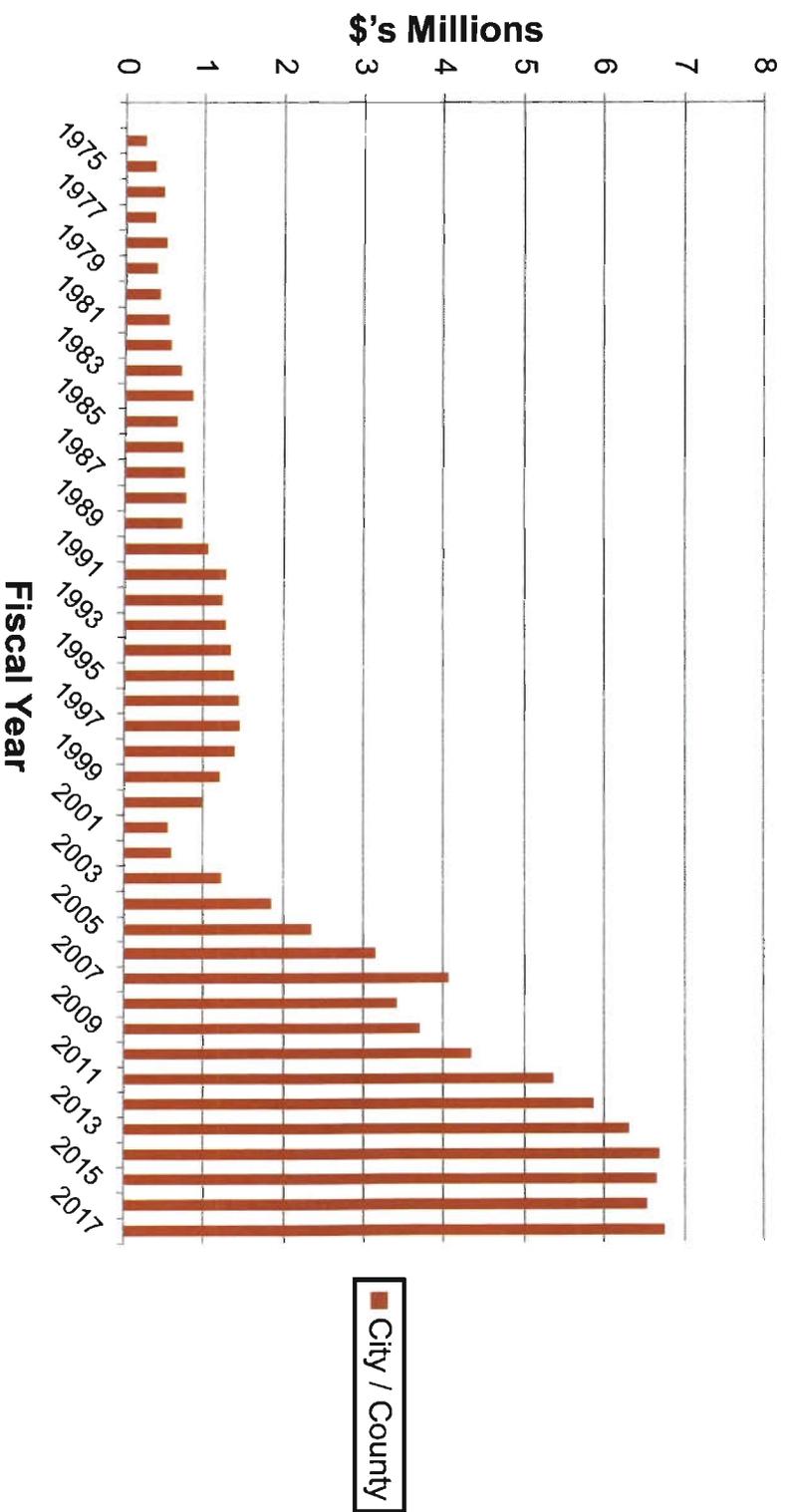
Projected UAAL and UAAL Amortization Payments



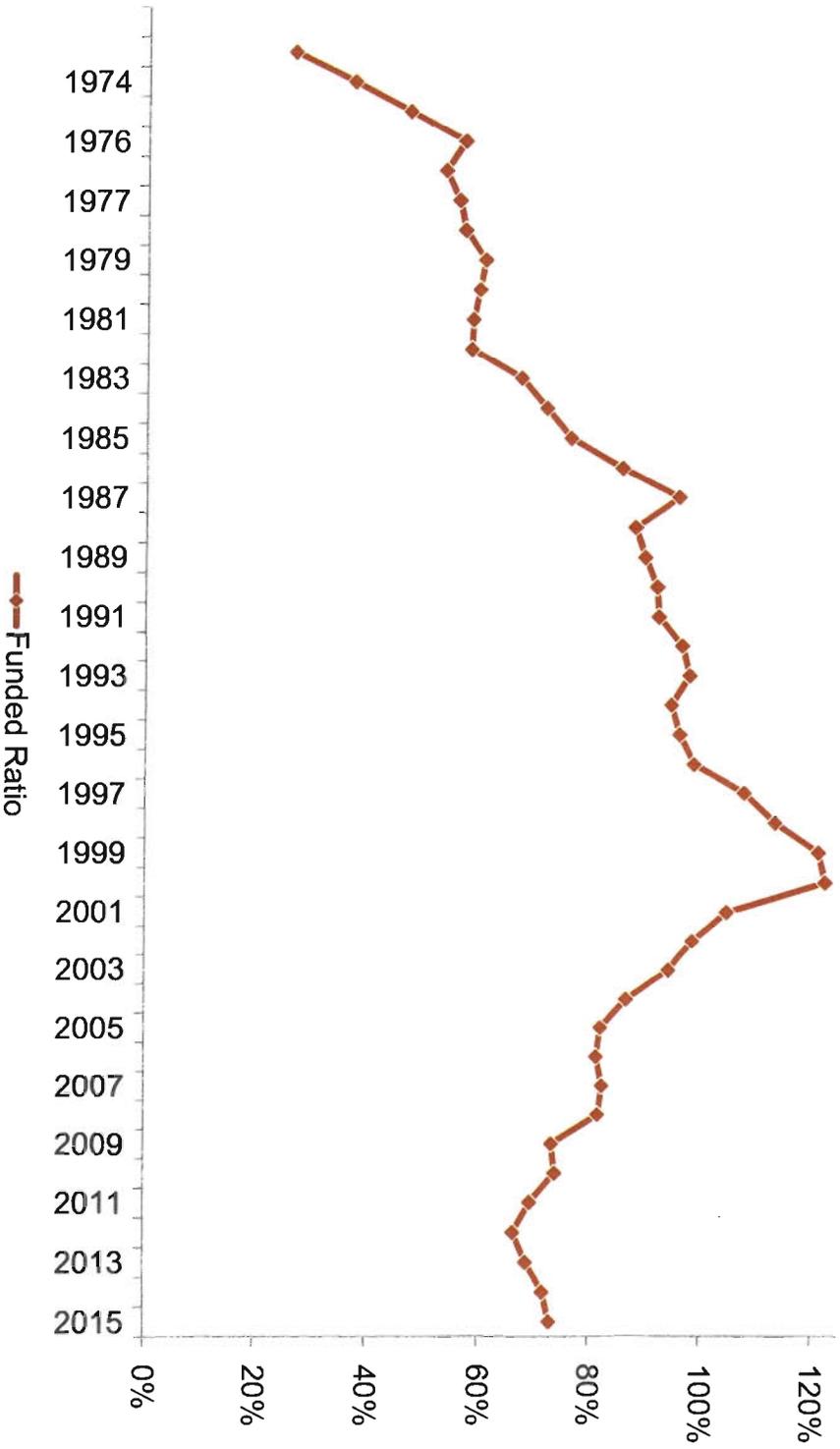


Historical Employer Contributions

A check cashing or payday loan store is an establishment subject to regulation by FL SS Chapter 560, Money Services Businesses, and that provides check cashing and/or deferred presentment transactions.

3. Standards

A check cashing or payday loan store shall be located at least 1,000 feet from another check cashing or payday loan store or from a pawn shop.

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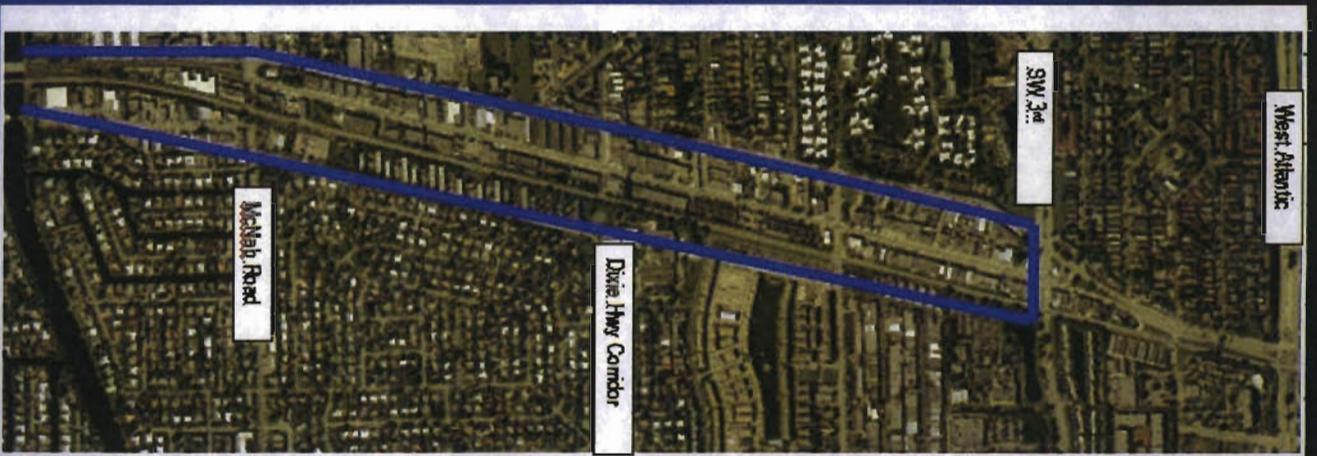

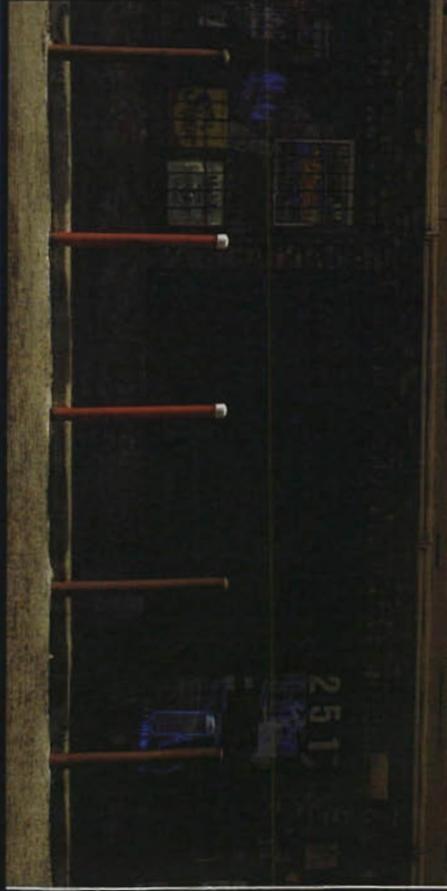

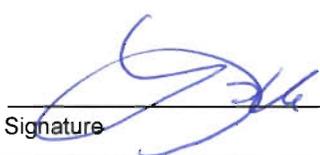
